adjustment lines

Lines that show where to lengthen or shorten the pattern piece to change the fit of the garment.

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Stitching used to secure the threads at the start and end of each seam.

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Long, loose stitches.

03 of 32 E-Flash Cards

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An enclosure for elastic or a drawstring that gathers the garment snugly to the body.

backstitching

Technique used on seams that form an inward curve to reduce fabric bulk and help the garment lie flat.

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The yarns that run across the fabric from one selvage to the other (horizontally).

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The bold, solid outlines on each pattern piece.

07 of 32 E-Flash Cards

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A stitched fold that gives shape and fullness to a garment so it fits the curves of the body.

Symbols used in a pattern piece to aid in matching seams and other construction details.

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A smooth stitch used to make fabric fit into a smaller space.

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Pieces of fabric used to cover raw edges in garment openings, such as armholes and necklines.

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Zippers, buttons, hooks and eyes, snaps, and hook and loop tape.

fasteners

gathering grading grain

A heavier stitch used to make fabric fit into a smaller space.

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Technique used on heavier fabrics or seams with three or more layers to reduce fabric bulk and help the garment lie flat.

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The direction yarns run in a fabric.

Diamond-shaped symbols along the cutting line in a pattern piece indicating exactly where to join pieces together.

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Cutting V-shaped sections from the seam allowance to reduce fabric bulk and help the garment lie flat.

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Items that become a part of a garment or project, such as thread, buttons, snaps, zippers, tapes, trims, and elastic.

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Fabric that does not have the crosswise and lengthwise yarns crossing at right angles. The fabric will look crooked and is hard to handle.
